Grants to Georgia Organizations and Individuals from Fiscal Years 2019 through 2023 – \$14.912.807

Total Number of Awards – 90

Award Highlights:

- Georgia State University is hosting K-12 educators from across the country for a professional development program. 72 teachers will come to Georgia to learn about the civil rights movement and desegregation in Atlanta.
- Georgia College and State University is collecting oral histories related to the life and work of author Flannery O'Connor, who lived nearby for most of her life. They will use the stories that they collect to produce podcasts and videos about her life and work.

NEH also provides annual funding to <u>Georgia Humanities</u>, the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.

Recent Georgia Humanities Highlights:

- The New Georgia Encyclopedia (NGE) is the nation's first born-digital state encyclopedia. Since 2004 it has provided ready access to authoritative scholarship on a wide variety of topics. All of its entries are written and reviewed by scholars, fact-checked by reference librarians at the University of Georgia, and updated regularly to reflect new information and recent developments.
- Georgia Humanities, in partnership with the Office of the Governor and the Georgia Council for the Arts, sponsors the annual Governor's Awards for the Arts & Humanities. The awards recognize and honor individuals and organizations that have made outstanding contributions to the civic or cultural vitality of the state.
