

IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS FOR INDIANA

Grants to Indiana Organizations and Individuals from Fiscal Years 2019 through 2023–\$17,188,945

Award Highlights:

Total Number of Awards – 123

- The Indiana Supreme Court is conducting an item-level preservation assessment for rare books held by its law library. They will also purchase archival storage supplies to protect and preserve its collection of materials that document the history of the Indiana Supreme Court.
- The Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art is developing a storage space renovation plan for collections currently held in warehouse spaces not designed for long-term preservation of collections. This will provide room for the collection to grow and continue to account for the cultural requirements of customary Native American Art and cultural items.

NEH also provides annual funding to <u>Indiana Humanities</u>, the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.

Recent Indiana Humanities Highlights:

- A grant to the Roberts Settlement, a historic Black settlement in Hamilton County, Indiana, supported a program on the migration of Free People of Color to Indiana in the early 19th century. More than 60 people attended the program in person, and 1,500 others watched online.
- The council hosted a conversation with Robin Wall Kimmerer, member of the Citizen Potawatomi
 Nation and author of Braiding Sweetgrass, at the Eiteljorg Museum. Kimmer shared Indigenous
 perspectives and cultural practices around understanding and appreciating the natural world
 and our relationship to it.
